
Erasmus+ Essen, **APRIL** 2023 Project Germany ERASMUS on stage

ABOUT THE PROJECT

During this amazing Erasmus experience, the students prepared a mini-play which they performed in the school's auditorium. The workshop was led by Julie Stearns, a professional that has lots of years of experience.

On Tuesday, we talked about similarities and differences between the books that were read by the students at their respective schools. This workshop has helped the students to develop problem-solving skills. We faced many problems such as books being from different eras, having to decide how to create a play of our own...

By Thursday, the participants had already finished their scripts, and thanks to the extraordinary commitment of some of the students, all the scripts were merged.

Afterwards, we decided which roles everyone would take.



ABOUT THE MINI-PLAY

Broadly speaking, the play is about a mysterious murder: a detective travels through time and through different countries to discover what happened. The mystery is of course not solved until the very end.

CREATIVE WORK




Inagine finding an old, yellowed photograph that tells a story from the 1930s. It is the story of Franz, an awkward boy who starts an apprenticeship in Vienna with Otto Trsnjek, the owner of a newspaper and cigar shop who lost his right arn in the Great War. Otto loves the peace and quiet of his little shop and the freedom that reading the world's newspapers opens up to hin and his custoners. But times are changing. The paperboy and the children who used to walk carefree in the streets are the first to notice that the nen who are carrying a new flag to Vienna are changing the atnosphere in the city. Custoners like the old Professor Freud, who has become a fatherly advisor to Franz, are suddenly no longer welcone in their own neighbourhood. And Franz's romance with the pretty Anezka, about whon he writes enthusiastically to his nother, seens to have no future either. When the hatred of angry neighbours is unleashed, Franz realises that it is time to write his own story – the story of one who is determined to find his own answers. Before coming to Essen we had to do some preparations in our own countries. We had to do a little research about what a bildungsroman is.

Following that we read different coming-ofage novels and bildungsromans, which all had similar structures and storylines.

The German group read "The Tobacconist", the Danish group read "The Perks of Being a Wallflower", the Spanish group read "Looking for Alaska", the Lithuanians read "Benedict's Thresholds", and the Polish students read "Springtime".

After reading each novel we had to do some creative writing. We could choose to write fanfics, Twitter novels, hyperpoems,...



A Story from Dark Times

What is the play of the German group about?

In the beginning, a young man (Franz) goes into the tobacco shop and asks the tobacconist (Otto Trsnjek) for a job in his shop. As Otto tells Franz about his experiences, some customers come and buy cigarettes and newspapers. When an old man (Prof. Freud) comes in, Otto tells Franz that he is a regular customer and when Freud leaves with cigarettes, Franz follows him because he forgot his hat in the shop. They talk about life and love.

In the next scene, you can see Franz's mother reading a letter in which he tells her about his new job and about a girl he met and that she is special to him. Suddenly Anezka leaves him because she is not able to make a living. She prefers a National Socialist with money.

One night, men dressed in black break into the tobacconist's shop and write 'Jew lover' on his wall. When Otto sees it in the morning he is shocked and can't believe it, but before he can do something about it, the Nazis come and arrest him. He ends up being killed.

After all Franz had to go through, he decides to take down the NS flag and puts up Otto's jacket instead.

In the last scene of the play everyone who had a role in the play lined up and told the audience why Franz might have done this.

What's the message?

After the murder of Otto Trsnjek, Franz takes a stand. He puts down the flag of the German Nazis and hoists the tobacconist's jacket instead - as a symbol of respect for the murdered Otto Trsnjek, and his deep anger at the murderers. At the end of the play, every actor comes on stage, saying why Franz may have decided for resistance. "Maybe he did it...". Every single person gives a possible reason: friendship, loyalty, a future without hatred.

"Maybe he did it... for you!"

ABOUT ESSEN

Essen is a city in the center of the Ruhr area and the Rhine-Ruhr metropolitan region. After Cologne, Düsseldorf and Dortmund, Essen is the fourth largest city in the state of North Rhine-Westphalia and one of the regional centers.

After Essen had become European Capital of Culture in 2010, it received the title of European Green Capital in 2017.

The German group, students of the Goetheschule, have been hosting some of us, the Erasmus students, and have been showing us the city and surroundings.

ZECHE ZOLLVEREIN



Until 1996 "Zeche Zollverein" used to produce coal. It was a very important colliery in Essen. In the past, many workers came from Poland and Turkey to the Ruhr Area, about 30% of them stayed after the coal mines had been closed and their families still live here.




Friday 21 th **Fourth day**

Finally, we all gathered together for a closing ceremony and received our Erasmus certificates. In the afternoon we had free time to enjoy with our new friends and host families.




Students share their experience
